Kaph (it is like the "caff" in "caffeine")			k	With the dot, the Kaph is a stop (hard) like the "k" in "kit."
			<u>k</u> or kh	Without the dot, the Kaph is a fricative (soft) like the "ch" in the German "ich."
			<u>k</u> or kh	This is a final kaph. It is only used when the kaph is the last letter of a word. It is a fricative (soft) like the "ch" in the German "ich."
Lamedh (the "e" is like the "e" in "met," and the "dh" is like the "th" in "wither")			l	The lamedh is like the "l" in "lay."
Mem (the "em" is like the "ame" in "same")			m	The mem is like the "m" in "may."
