(4) Translation

The attributive participle is translated like an adjectival clause which is introduced by the relative pronoun "who" if it refers to a person or "which" if it refers to a thing (e.g. D') [] [] - "the priests who were teaching" and [] [] - "the house which was burning").

2. Predicate Participle

a. Definition of the Predicate Participle

The predicate participle affirms or predicates something of the word with which it goes (e.g. "the priest was teaching").

The predicate participle agrees with the word with which it goes in gender and number, but not usually in definiteness (e.g.) 7777 7737).
