- D. It usually causes the perfect tense to be translated like the imperfect tense (e.g. געָרָט אָרָט "he will come and he will judge").
 - NOTE: When the waw consecutive with the perfect tense is preceded by the imperative, the waw consecutive causes the perfect tense to be translated like the imperative (e.g. 2 Sam. 7:5 קיון אַמָרָקָ
- E. It usually causes the Tone to be thrown forward from the penult to the last syllable (e.g. אָשָׁלַ שָׁ but with the waw consecutive -אָשָׁלַ שָׁוֹן).
- IV. Waw Conjunctive with the Verb
 - A. With the Perfect Tense

The waw conjunctive is not used very often with the perfect tense, but when it is used, it is used several times to carry on Hebrew narration (e.g. 1 Kings 12:32 T'DYT) - "and he stationed" or "set").

B. With the Imperfect Tense

C. With the Imperative

The waw conjunctive is used with the imperative when the imperative is preceded by another imperative. In this case the first imperative expresses a condition while the second imperative expresses the consequence which the fulfillment of that condition will involve. This consequence is expressed by the imperative because it is intended or desired by the speaker (e.g. Gen. 42:18 γ_{χ} , γ_{χ} ,
