- 5) He would tell the wife of whom the husband was jealous that she was to drink this solution.
 - i) If she drank it and nothing happened to her, then she was innocent.
 - ii) But if she drank it and her thigh wasted away and her stomach swelled, then the husband would know she was guilty.
- 6) The priest would then take and write that curse on a scroll and he would wash the scroll off into that clay pot and she would have to drink it.
 - i) If she were innocent, nothing would happen.
 - ii) If she were guilty, her thigh would waste away and her stomach would swell.

4. The law of the Nazarite (6)

- The vow of the Nazarite was a vow an Israelite could make to separate himself to the Lord for a period of time.
- ii. The vow had the following requirements:
 - a. He would abstain from eating or drinking anything from the vine
 - b. He wouldn't touch or be around any dead body.
 - c. He would let his hair grow.
- iii. When the time was over for which he had consecrated himself to the Lord, he would go to the tabernacle and offer a sin offering, burnt offering and fellowship offering.
- iv. When he offered the fellowship offering, he cut his hair and put it on the altar of burnt offering under the fellowship offering and that would end his vow.
- 5. Last events at Sinai (7-9)
 - i. Ceremonial enactments (7-8)
 - a. Chapter 7
 - We have the dedication of the tabernacle.
 - 2) When we started the book of Numbers, the census was taken on the first day of the 2nd moth of the 2nd year.
 - 3) When you come to chapter 7, you are back tracking a little bit.
 - 4) What happened here happened right after the tabernacle and the altar had been anointed.
 - i) See 7:1
 - ii) When Moses finished setting up the tabernacle, he anointed it and all the furnishings.
 - iii) Moses did that when he consecrated the priests.
